Like most parents. Monica would do anything for her child. So, when her son, an Iraq war veteran, was having serious health problems, she didn't think twice about dropping everything to be there for him.

Over the next year and a half, Monica put her life on hold, leaving behind her job and other responsibilities to help her son recover. When his situation finally improved, Monica accepted an invitation to live with a friend in Arlington.

But when those housing plans fell through, Monica wasn't sure what to do next. With no job and very little money, Monica needed help — and thanks to caring people like you, she found that support at the Arlington Life

LEAVE A LEGACY



A Mother and Son are Grateful to You



When Tabitha tragically lost her husband more than a year ago, her whole life changed in an instant. She was devastated - and nothing could ever fill the gaping hole in her heart.

As she worked through the grieving process, Tabitha knew she had to stay strong for her school-age son, Bradley. But without a regular source of income, affording life's basic necessities became nearly impossible. Homelessness soon

became part of their life story.

But Tabitha refused to give
up. While she had spent the last
several years as a full-time mom
and homemaker, before that, she
was a nurse. Unfortunately, too
much time had passed and her
license was expired. Desperate to
provide some form of income for
her family, she accepted the first

job she could find — a position at a local fast food restaurant.

Even thought Tabitha was working hard, carrying extra shifts when possible, the resources just weren't enough to raise her young son. She was relieved when a school staff member referred them to the Arlington Life Shelter. While here, she has been able to collect her thoughts and plan while providing Bradley with the resources he needs to grieve his father and feel a sense of stability.

Tabitha has now begun a job in healthcare to sharpen her skills as she takes the necessary steps to recertify as a nurse.

Every day, hard-working neighbors like Tabitha come to the Shelter in hopes of putting their lives back together. For many, this takes time and specialized care that is only available because partners like you give.
